## **VETERANS CRISIS LINE GUN SAFETY VIDEO**

## **About the Video**

- What: The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) suicide prevention program office has developed an outreach video to emphasize the importance of taking precautions at home when a firearm is present.
- How it will be used: The video is primarily used by VA Suicide Prevention Coordinators (SPCs) in their community outreach and education efforts.
- The main message: Simple actions can help individuals and families stay safe, especially during emotional or stressful times, or when someone in the home is in crisis. This video encourages Veterans, Service Members, and their families to make sure guns and ammunition are safely secured in their home, particularly when someone is experiencing a period of depression or crisis.
- Experts consulted: Content and messaging for this video was developed with assistance from subject matter experts at the <u>Harvard Injury Control Research Center</u> and the <u>National Shooting</u> <u>Sports Foundation</u>. Veterans of various ages, service eras, demographics, and geographies also contributed.

## About Firearms, Safety, and Deaths

- Gun deaths: Firearms were one of the top five leading causes of injury-related deaths nationwide in 2010.<sup>1</sup>
- Veterans and guns: Data collected between 2003 and 2006 show that Veterans use firearms more frequently than the general population in acts of suicide. Male and female Veterans are, respectively, 1.3 and 1.6 times more likely to use firearms compared with non-Veterans.<sup>2</sup>
- **Guns in homes:** Research conducted in 2012 showed that firearms could be found in roughly 34 percent of homes nationwide.<sup>3</sup>
- Lessening the risk: There is an 80 percent reduced risk of unintentional firearm deaths among youths when guns and ammunition are stored separately in a lockbox.<sup>4</sup>
